3 Against 1

Willard H. Saxby, according to Seventh-day Adventist yearbooks for 1890-1895, was an ordained minister serving the church in Ohio. While attending Ohio camp meeting, he received an eleven page letter from Sister Ellen White, telling him some things about himself he had trouble seeing and accepting. The letter was sent through Elder A who asked Saxby if he believed in the *Testimonies*. In response to Elder Saxby's response in the affirmative, and after they had prayed together, Elder A began to read aloud the letter from Sister White. After a few paragraphs he came to a statement to which Saxby strongly objected. "That is not so!" Saxby exclaimed, emphatically.

"Brother Saxby, you say it is so, and the Lord will help you see that it is so." "But how can I say a thing is so when I know it is not so?" Elder Saxby protested. "Brother Saxby, you say it is so, and the Lord will help you see that it is so," Elder A repeated. With that he continued reading and the scene, with Elder Saxby exclaiming "it is not so!" and Elder A repeating "you say it is so and the Lord will help you see it is so" continued to the close of the letter. The letter finished, Elder Saxby having received permission to take it home shared the letter, (at least the part he had most trouble with), with his wife. After he had read it, Mrs. Saxby abuptly sat up in bed and said with all earnestness of which she was capable, *"Willard, it is so!"*

In the following days, as I sought the Lord through fasting and prayer, he wrote, I soon saw things in the true light. The testimony was a photograph of my inner life, and I could see that it was so.

Never was there a time when so many doctors were to be found, or so many medicines, new medical discoveries, wonderful scientific achievements in surgery, mind cures, faith cures, and all manner of other cures. And yet, the world is still sick; nearly all are looking for relief.

Seventh-day Adventists take what is really a balanced position upon the subject of divine healing. We recognize the promise in the Word that God will heal sickness, and yet we do not think it out of harmony with true faith in God to call upon the wise and conscientious physician, and to use natural remedies in an effort to recover strength. We believe in sanitariums and treatment rooms, and have established them for the purpose of fostering health and healing.

We believe in diet and well-prepared health foods. There is surely a vital relationship between eating and health. And yet, after all these different means have been used, we frequently find individuals who, because of the nature of their disease, do not recover, but rather grow worse. In extreme cases, in which patients have been given up by their physicians as hopeless, some have availed themselves of the heavenly Physician, and have made definite recovery - not because the doctor was mistaken in his diagnosis or in the seriousness of the malady, but because there is real divine healing by faith.

And it came about that the father of Publius was lying in bed afflicted with recurrent fever and dysentery; and Paul went in to see him and after he had prayed, he laid his


hands on him and healed him. So when this was done, others also, which had diseases in the island, came, and were healed.

Prayer Should Be Offered for the Sick With Calm Faith

I was shown that in case of sickness, where the way is clear for the offering up of prayer for the sick, the case should be committed to the Lord in calm faith, not with a storm of excitement. He alone is acquainted with the past life of the individual and knows what his future will be. He who is acquainted with the hearts of all men [and women] knows whether the person, if raised up, would glorify His name or dishonor Him by backsliding and apostasy. All that we are required to do is to ask God to raise the sick up if in accordance with His will, believing that He hears the reasons which we present and the fervent prayers offered. If the Lord sees it will best honor Him, He will answer our prayers. But to urge recovery without submission to His will is not right.

With all our treatments given to the sick, simple fervent prayer should be offered for the blessing of healing. We are to point the sick to the compassionate Saviour, and His power to forgive and to heal.

The Boldness of God's Friends

And he said unto them, "which of you shall have a friend, and shall go unto him at midnight, and say unto him, Friend, lend me three loaves; for a friend of mine in his journey is come to me, and I have nothing to set before him? Jesus, in Matthew 7:17 said that "ye shall know them by their fruits" and later, in the Parable of the Sower (Matthew 13), said that "he that received seed into the good ground is he that heareth the word, and understandeth it; which also beareth fruit".

But what is the fruit we are to bear? Are we to bear oranges, pears, mangos or some other fruit?

In Romans 1: 13, the apostle Paul writes that he would like to "have some fruit among you also, even as among other Gentiles." From this we understand that winning souls to Christ and helping them grow is bearing fruit. Paul also speaks of contributing to the poor as a "fruit" in Romans 15: 25-28 while developing a Christlike character is also referred to as the "fruit" of the Spirit in Galatians 5.

Just as the primary responsibility and function of the branch is to bear fruit, so it is with us. It is God's will that His children will bear the fruit of His Holy Spirit, the fruit of a Christlike character and the fruit of good works.

In Hebrews 13:15 we are also told that "by him [Jesus], therefore let us offer the sacrifice of praise to God continually, that is, the fruit of our lips giving thanks to his name.

Prayer focus:

That we may allow God to prune us that we may bring forth the good fruit of His Holy Spirit.

To Bring Forth Much Fruit

John 15: 1-2, 8 KJV

I am the true vine, and my Father is the husbandman. Every branch in me that beareth not fruit he taketh away: and every branch that beareth fruit, he purgeth it, that it may bring forth more fruit. . . . Herein is my Father glorified, that ye bear much fruit; so shall ye be my disciples.

Prayer Essential to God

It must never be forgotten that Almighty God rules this world. He is not an absentee God. His hand is ever on the throttle of human affairs. He is everywhere present in the concerns of time. Jonah was a prophet of the Lord and a fugitive from God and from his place of duty. Yet in his distress he called upon the Lord, and God heard him and rescued him from "the belly of hell." (Jonah 2:2)

Help to find time and voice to pray so that God will find time and voice to answer.

Jonah 2:7

When my soul fainted within me I remembered the LORD: and my prayer came in unto thee, into thine holy temple.
