Prayer Leader's Section:

We all know what a branch is. Its essential characteristic is that it is simply a growth of the vine, produced by it and appointed to bear its fruit. It has only one reason for existence. It is there at the bidding of the vine, that through it the vine may bear and ripen its precious fruit.

Just as the vine lives solely and wholly to produce the sap that makes the grape, so the branch has the singular object of receiving the sap and bearing the grape. Its only work is to serve the vine, in order that through it the vine may do its work.

What sort of life, according to the parable, must we lead to bear fruit? What must we be or do that will enable us to pray as we should, and to receive what we ask for? The answer is in one word: the branch-life gives power for prayer.

We are branches of Christ, the Living Vine. We must simply live like branches - abide in Christ - then we shall ask what we will, and it shall be done unto us.

"If ye abide in Me," our Lord says, you shall ask and it shall be done unto you. It is the prayer of a righteous man, according to James 5:16, that avails much. We receive whatsoever we ask, John says, because we obey and please God.

Putting the "Grit" Back into Integrity

Interestingly, grit, "stubborn courage," lies embedded in our English word integrity. Now the root of the word integrity comes from Latin. The first part, in, stands for "not," and the last part comes from tangere, meaning "to touch." Thus the basic meaning is "untouched," "whole," or "entire." The dictionary definition reads, "The quality or state of being complete," and by extension it is "the quality or state of beiong of sound moral principle; uprightness, honesty, and sincerity." But to be this kind of individual today certainly takes grit and fortitude and a lot of it.

Integrity involves the whole being - what a person is inside as well as outside. It is not something we can put on and take off as a garment. It is a cloak that we must wear everyday and for every occasion. Even in doing good works today the best of men and women succumb to the temptation to take moral shortcuts. "The end justifies the means" when it comes to padding expense accounts; cheating on income taxes, trimming down income to reduce tithes and offerings, or remaining silent when others are falsely accused or criticized. It's easy to say, "Well, this doesn't really matter, because everyone is doing it."

The greatest want of the world is the want of men [and women] who will not be bought or sold, ... who in their inmost souls are true and honest, ... who do not fear to call sin by its right name, ... whose conscience is as true to duty as the needle to the pole, [men and women] who will stand for the right though the heavens fall.

In his capacity as a former vice-president of the General Conference, I.H. Evans (1913–1918), had to do a great deal of traveling. Each time he returned home, he had the practice of taking a small gift to each of his children. Arriving home from a trip late one night, he went to bed without awakening the children to let them know he had returned. The next morning he was out in his yard when his little boy came running toward him shouting, "Hello, Daddy! Hello Daddy!"

Elder Evans picked up his son and greeted him, then the boy asked "Daddy, what did you bring me this time?" "I brought you an orange," was the response. (That was in the days when oranges were not as readily available in certain areas as now.) The boy slid out of his father's arms, shouting "I have an orange! I have an orange!" His son's unquestioning acceptance of his word struck Elder Evans so forcefully that he asked, "let me see your orange." His eyes beginning to fill with tears, the lad held out his empty hands, "Don't I have an orange?" Ashamed at having raised a doubt in his son's mind, Elder Evans assured him, "Yes, you have; of course you have. It is in my bag in the closet."

That is faith, simple faith. The type of faith that all must possess in God. It is trustingly believing God, who cannot lie, and who does not deceive and acting upon that belief. God has made every provision for our salvation. Let us take Him at His word, inquiring "what must I do to be saved." Acts 16:30

Remembering the God who is a Mighty Hand of Help in any situation.



Like these early disciples, we are counseled, "It is our work, by confession, humiliation, repentance, and earnest prayer, to fulfill the conditions upon which God has promised to grant us His blessing.

The purpose of our prayer and devotional life is not to achieve a degree of holiness that makes us superior to others. Instead, it helps us realize our need to come humbly before the Lord to receive His righteousness, grace, wisdom, and strength. It empowers us to reveal the loving character of Jesus to others so we can be powerful witnesses of His grace and truth.

Our Lord urgently appeals to every member of the church to have a deeper relationship with Him in prayer, Bible study, and the study of the Spirit of Prophecy as manifested in the writings of Ellen G. White. He calls us to a deeper commitment to witness and evangelism. He invites us to seek the outpouring of the Holy Spirit for the power of the latter rain to finish His work on earth. God's mission must be accomplished in God's power (Zech. 10:1; Rom. 9:28).

And let none flatter themselves that sins cherished for a time can easily be given up by and by. This is not so. Every sin cherished weakens the character and strengthens habit; and physical, mental, and moral depravity is the result. You may repent of the wrong you have done, and set your feet in right paths; but the mold of your mind and your familiarity with evil will make it difficult for you to distinguish between right and wrong. Through the wrong habits formed, Satan will assail you again and again.
